YEAR 7 SPONSORED READ




most books, and there will be a class prize too for











Chapel News

I was invited (together with two Trinity pupils) to attend the Licensing and Installation of Reverend Jim Bennett, who you may remember did a placement with us this time last year, as Priest in Charge of St Augustine, Slade Green last Sunday 6th October. We were delighted to be representing Trinity School and to process in and out with the visiting clergy and wish Jim every happiness in his new ministry. The service itself lasts an hour, involves readings and hymns chosen by the new minister, and is the legal and traditional form by which a person is commissioned for a new ministry as a Priest in the Church of England. By law, the Priest has to make the Declaration of Assent, and take the Oath of Allegiance to Her Majesty the Queen and the Oath of Canonical Obedience to the Bishop. This, put simply makes public how the Church of England is part of the Anglican Communion, which in turn is part of the whole Church. The Priest states publicly that she/he will follow the traditions of the Church of England and use only those forms of service, which are authorised or allowed by canon law. Then, taking a Bible in the hand, the Priest will swear allegiance to Queen Elizabeth the Second, her heirs and successors. They will then turn to the Bishop and swear allegiance to the Lord Bishop of Rochester, and his successors, in all things lawful and honest. Of course, nobody can do any of these things alone. Bishop Simon preached about the Wisdom of Solomon whom we remember was offered anything by God and chose wisdom above riches and wealth. Bishop Simon pointed out about the 'war' against wisdom in our society today with fake news designed to confuse, wind us up whilst frustrating us into passivity. He reminded us that Jim, as any priest, may not always get it right but together. He finished with a quote from Maya

Angelou "The desire to reach for the stars is ambitious. The desire to reach the hearts is wise". I have gone into detail about this because it brought back great memories of my service of Licensing and Installation with Bishop James here at Trinity School in September 2017. My certificate sits proudly in my office and more importantly reminds me of my duties towards each and every one of you and our joint calling to proclaim the Good News afresh to each generation! Imagine if we could all go around beaming with joy because we are so loved by God. Beyond all our understanding. We share this gift of grace, so let us rejoice together! Overall, it was a very happy occasion with unbelievable amounts of food and chatter afterwards. We thought we were not hungry at first, but we lied!

One of the great things about having faith is working out a closer relationship with God.
Context is everything, and here at Trinity School we are a Church of England school, which means that we are part of a specific body of people 85 million strong – the Anglican Communion! Started in 1867 by the Archbishop of Canterbury it was and remains, a means of drawing together all the different strands of heart-felt belief amongst this diverse group of Christians.

As you may well be aware the Church of England came about in the first place because King Henry 8th wanted to divorce the Pope's niece – well, there were other slightly more complicated events going on in societies around the world at the same time. However, this demonstrates how the Christian faith continually reforms itself from the inside out. It is always involved with renewal and understanding God through Jesus Christ and The Holy Spirit.

Understanding The Trinity is more than grasping that this simply is our School name! Jesus met and







dealt with people where they were at, to use a colloquial expression! He reserved his sternest criticisms for those people who thought that they knew everything about expressing religious faith. He also famously turned over the tables of the moneylenders in The Temple forecourts because he was outraged at the commercialisation and selling of religion. As in 'Jesus Christ Superstar' Ted Neeley in fine falsetto voice sings, "My Father's House should be a house of prayer, but you have made it a den of thieves!"

Here at Trinity, we try to develop the idea that belief does not occur in a vacuum; and that whatever their individual faith, or none, is that each person is made in God's image. Belief involves belonging and occurs in a specific place and time. Nothing is random. We all belong to our own families and diverse communities and we all come together and belong to this community and family here at Trinity School. We put down roots here together and build each other up which gives everybody the strength and courage to withstand the 'slings and arrows of outrageous fortune' should they occur!
