ONLINE SAFETY NEWS

Calling all problem solvers, cryptographers and computer programmers! An exciting opportunity has arisen to help young people develop their understanding of online safety. The Matrix Challenge is part of a national cyber competition running at the moment aimed at 11-17 year olds. See https://www.matrix-challenge.uk/ for further details. The initial challenge is via an online platform and has been set as homework to complete if they wish, by their ICT/Computer Science teachers. This non-compulsory homework is a game that should take 35 to 45 minutes to complete. There will be 5 elements tested: The Computer Misuse Act 1990, staying safe online, steganography, python coding and a cipher. The challenge is designed to test digital skills and encourage the development of abilities that would enable a career in the cyber security landscape. Participants will be able to compete in the challenge anytime up to Friday 14th February. The top performing participants from the online competition will be invited to a regional semi-final that will take place in Central London in March 2020. This will test further practical skills - likely to involve capture the flag style competitions, teambuilding exercise and puzzle solving skills. Participants successful at regional semi-finals will be invited to compete in a national final on Saturday 4th July. Various skills will be tested with previous finals incorporating capture the flag, open source social media, drone capture, lock picking and team events.

This week saw us celebrate Holocaust Memorial Day

Date: 27th January

What is it?: Holocaust Memorial Day provides an opportunity for everyone to learn lessons from the Holocaust, Nazi persecution and subsequent genocides and apply them to the present day to create a safer, better future. In school last week, we had visitors from Protection Approaches do an interactive workshop with everyone in the school, throughout the day, which focused on the harrowing events that took place during the Holocaust, but then spread to other persecution, which has happened since e.g. segregation and terrorism. It looked at why these things may have happened, and asked pupils to consider what could be done to stop any similar awful things from ever happening again.


